As a team of gears works in unison behind the scenes, they are moving in different directions and at different speeds; linked together they each have their own responsibility, but the same goal. Despite Financial woes, the Canton Public School District is still working to improve student achievement

School leaders in the Canton Public School District have been working hard to move the district forward. Superintendent Dwight Luckett says, "After assessing the test score results, there are areas in which we obviously need to improve, but there are also areas where there has been growth and achievement like in some of our elementary schools where we scored better than the state average."

Third graders at Canton Elementary once again scored above the state average in percent proficient in Language Arts and & Math. CES' fourth graders also scored higher than the state average in percent proficient in Language Arts & Math. CES also had an increase in the number of fourth and fifth grade students that are proficient and above in Language Arts & Math.

"I am encouraged that our students are scoring higher than the state average but we are still striving and focused on becoming a "Star School. I encourage parents to help us achieve our goal," says Canton Elementary Principal Dorothy Smith.

School officials say, while results from the state mandated MCT2 and Subject Area Tests were not where the district would like to be in overall student achievement, the district is making tremendous improvements in areas not measured by the state test. They say those improvements are having a positive impact on academic achievement as school administrators and teachers work to move all of its schools to successful performing and above. Educators say the district has improved the culture and climate at all schools making them a more conducive environment for learning. The district has tremendously reduced the number of fights or other disturbances at all schools and increased safety by adding a Security Department. The district has also increased the daily average attendance at all schools. Now more students are graduating and less are dropping out of school. In May, the district celebrated its largest graduating class in over 15 years with 175 students graduating from Canton High School.

While last year the district was excited to show significant growth by moving three of four of its schools out of school improvement status, that move cost the district a tremendous amount in federal dollars to provide critical remediation strategies to help struggling students. The District lost more than \$879,000.00 dollars to aid students at Canton Elementary, McNeal, Canton High, and Nichols Middle. This year it will only receive approximately \$232,000.00 for Nichols Middle School, the only school that remains in School Improvement. The District also struggled to provide needed services to improve academic performance district wide, after it lost \$1.2 million dollars in State budget cuts. Those cuts resulted in the loss of Curriculum/Instructional Specialists, Intervention Specialists, Behavior Specialists, Tutors, and a number of educational programs aimed at increasing academic performance. The Canton Public School District, like many districts, had to try to adjust to fewer financial resources while trying to sustain its student's academic performance.

Despite financial woes, the district has revamped its curriculum department and devised a plan of action to strengthen areas of weakness and continue efforts to improve its students' academic achievement. Superintendent Dwight Luckett says, "We are looking at the data in our weak areas and putting forth all our efforts in providing quality personnel and other resources needed to improve in these areas. When I look at the district over the last several years, we've shown growth in many areas, and we are working continuously to improve."

- We have strategically placed teachers with a record of accomplishment in critical areas.
- We are using federal dollars appropriately to make sure teachers have requested supplies that are critical to teaching and learning.
- We are bringing in teacher coaches to Canton High, Nichols Middle, and Canton School of Arts and Sciences to work throughout the year to identify and shore up teacher weaknesses.
- We will continue to give best remediation and extra help to students who have scored minimal and basic.
- We are asking for more parental involvement to assist us in the educational process to increase our student achievement.

Concerned Parent Irma Meeks, who is treasurer of the PTA at her twin grandsons' school says, "You can't put it all on the school district, and you can't put it all on the teachers. "Parents need to get involved and do their share, too." She says she applauds the district for its many improvements but more parents are still needed for the district to reach its full potential. She says parents can volunteer at the school and work one on one with a child, even if it is not their own. Meeks said she helps her grandsons with their homework. She sometimes sits in on the after-school tutoring sessions to help familiarize herself with the boys' studies. She says if parents, business leaders, the school board, and educators all work together, student achievement will definitely improve.

TEST SCORE ANALYSIS BY

Cassandra Williams, Executive Director of Curriculum and Instruction

The district has continued to show improvement in student achievement at Canton Elementary. Third graders once again scored above the state average in percent proficient in Language Arts and & Math. CES' fourth graders also scored higher than the state average in percent proficient in Language Arts & Math. CES had a 14.5 % increase in the number of fourth grade students that are proficient and above in Language Arts. CES had a 26% increase in the number of fourth graders that are proficient and above in Math. CES had a 17.8% increase in the number of fifth grade students that are proficient and above in Language Arts. CES had a 9% increase in the number of students that are proficient and above in Math.

District wide 51% of Third Graders were proficient and advanced in Language Arts -that dropped 9%

District wide 55% of Third Graders were proficient and advanced in Math -that dropped 5%

That is not a significant drop

Of the 5% and 9% decrease, those students were only 1 or 2 points from being proficient

Canton School of Arts & Sciences CSAS Fifth Graders had a significant increase, 17%, in the number of students scoring proficient and above in Language Arts. CSAS Fifth Graders also increased by 4.3% in the number of students

scoring advanced in Math.

Principal LaShonda Catchings says, "Although our test scores are not where we want them to be there were several high points. Our 5th grade students showed significant gains on both language arts and math. In fact our students scored highest in the district in math. In addition, the majority of our students in grades 3-5 that did not score proficiency only missed it by a few points. That means we are headed in the right direction. Our plan of action is to use our common planning time to focus on data analysis, developing lesson plans, and constructing assessments that reflect the rigor and format of MCT2. We are also using planning time to conduct interventions on students that are struggling on identified objectives according to district and teacher-made assessments. We have also started the "Word of the Day" in which I announce over the intercom a word that will appear on MCT2 and its definition."

The school also had a 2% increase in the number of Eighth Grade students proficient and above in Math. Nichols also had a 1.2% increase in the number of Eighth Grade students Proficient and Advanced in Language Arts.

Canton High Principal Richard Gray says, CHS students this school term can take an eighth class where they get extra help on preparing for statemandated tests .Two teachers have been hired to help students with the English 2 and Algebra 1 testing. Tutoring will also be offered after school at Canton High. Gray says he is making sure parents and students understand the urgency of the subjectarea tests. "They know the urgency of it, and they know if they don't pass the test and the course they

can't graduate," Gray said. "I think it's going to help us get more students passing the tests and making higher scores on the tests."

Public Relations Efforts to Highlight Student Achievement

Several years ago, the Canton Public School District was advised to create a Public Relations Department, to improve its image, make its stakeholders aware of student achievement, increase parental involvement, aid in dropout prevention, attract highly qualified teachers and administrators, and perform other duties to strengthen the overall support for the school district. The reason cited was that many of its positive stories and activities were not being highlighted in the mainstream media.

The Public Relations Office goal has been to build partnerships with parents, business, and community leaders in an effort to work together to provide the best educational opportunities for our students.

From its very inception, the Public Relations Office has utilized every possible medium to fulfill the mission of the district. The district has published newsletters, created videos, purchased print and television ads, sent out press releases, created a radio show, created dropout prevention radio ads, utilized billboard ads, utilized Power Point Presentations and other means to carry its message.

The district feels these efforts were critical in reaching its goals because often times the mainstream media either minimizes, fails to cover, or out-

right ignores any positive gains made in the Canton Public School District. Many times photos and press releases highlighting positive accomplishments are never used for whatever reason.

While some of the improvements may not be as large as its neighboring districts, they are still improvements in the right direction. Even when the district's third graders' test scores were higher than the state's average this year and last year, the district feels any negatives that could be sighted overshadowed it. Our district has gone from a 29.7% graduation rate to 68.7%. That is a major improvement. Is it where we want it to be? No, but it is an improvement in the right direction. We are continuously working to increase our academic accountability ratings and student achievement at all schools. These are just examples of why it is so critically important for us to tell our own story of achievement and success because we are improving. We do have alumni who are doctors, lawyers, engineers, and others in successful professions. We are graduating more students. In May, the district celebrated its largest graduating class in over 15 years with 179 students graduating from Canton High School. We are transforming lives and building futures. We must share our successes if we are to continue to attract highly qualified teachers and administrators to our struggling district. We are often compared to our neighboring districts on just about everything we do; their successes often make the headlines. They seem to get all the positive press they need. They don't have to go the extra mile to highlight student achievement, increase parental involvement, or attract highly qualified personnel. We do. That's why we will continue doing what we know is right for our community and what we know will help us achieve our mission to enable our students to become self-directed lifelong learners and effective communicators who are prepared to continue their education and/ or enter the global workplace and participate in society as responsible citizens. Regardless of labels, the Canton Public School District must continue to inspire and motivate our students that they are capable of achieving and can be successful in life.


