





Recently, Jamelia won the Class III powerlifting title for her weight class at the Mississippi Coliseum on April 5, 2014. She has won in her respective weight class and has also made the Elite 11 team for three consecutive years. Owens broke and set new records for Class III bench press and dead lift with a combination of 660 pounds. She set a new state Class III record for her weight class in bench press with 210 pounds. She also tied the Class III 1,025 total points. Jamelia was recently the "Metro Area High School Athlete of the Week" and has been nominated for the "2014 PopStar Award in Girls Power lifting."

Owens represents many things to the Tiger's athletic department. Tiger fans have been watching this young lady blossom since her freshman year of high school as a member of the volleyball, softball, basketball, track and field, and power-lifting teams.

Jamelia loves to play sports, travel, meet new people, and try exotic foods. As a ninth grader, she surprised her competition with a total over 900 points. As a sophomore under new leadership and a very strong willed mentor, Jamelia was eager to start the powerlifting season but with a purpose. She wanted respect! She exploded with a total of 1, 010 points to win her second championship for powerlifting. Jamelia set a new dead lift and bench press record for Class III and tied the state record for bench press. In addition to her second powerlifting championship, she was a member of the 2013-2014 Girls 5A State Championship Basketball Team, and the Girls 5A track and field runner up team where she won first place in shot put and discus.

After a jubilee season as a sophomore, Jamelia returns as a junior with some surprises. She has been battling quite a few injuries with her toe, chine, and back. With all the injuries throughout each sports season, Jamelia knew the task at hand and she knew the journey consists of persistence, hard work, and dedication. Jamelia says, "With the agonizing pain I was experiencing, I couldn't turn back." She took ice baths, stretched three times a day, and even changed her eating habits to prepare her for the state meet. She dedicated this season to her sister Brionna Owens, who is also a member of the powerlifting team.

Surprisingly, Jamelia had some unexpected competition this year with Tina Harris from Meridian High School who squatted 485 pounds, giving her the state record for squats. "When she cleared that squat, I became very nervous but my coach told me to stay positive," says Owens. Her mentor, Canton native Coach Shako Freeman, gave her a motivational pep talk. Jamelia says excitedly, "Coach has a way of recharging your spirit! You can be very low or upset and she has a way of getting you to go all out." Thanks to Coach Freeman's strategic plan, Jamelia did recharge by breaking and setting new records for bench press and dead lifts in Class III. "All coaches and teammates see a leader and one of any team's most talented players in Jamelia. She is a very talented and gifted athlete who works hard," says Coach Freeman.

Jamelia looks forward to next season, when she will be a senior and battle it out again with her competitors, but in the meantime, her focus has shifted to her next sport, track and field.
