NICHOLS MIDDLE SCHOOL A-TEAAM

Nichols Middle School students serving as Ambassadors of the Evers Academy for African-American Males (A-TEAAM) mentoring program were inspired by a visit from the widow of slain civil rights activist Medgar Evers.

Myrlie Evers-Williams encouraged Nichols Middle School Students to become leaders and never take no for an answer like her late husband Medgar. "Use your intellect to improve yourself, your community, and the world. Sit up, think, and act tall because you are important. You may not understand it all completely now, but you are the future of all of us. We hope and pray to work along with you. There's nothing like seeing strong, black men move out into the community and make change." Evers-Williams reminded mentees their roles as ambassadors come with a responsibility to others.

Canton Mayor Arnel Bolden also encouraged members of the A-TEAAM to set high standards and goals for themselves so they can be role models for their peers to follow.

Canton Public Schools Superintendent Dwight Luckett told mentees they must believe in themselves, believe they can accomplish great things in life and with hard work and perseverance they can achieve.

Ten sixth grade males were selected to participate in the program this year. The students are mentored after school by mentors from community organizations. These sessions are held on Tuesdays from 3:00-4:30p.m. at Nichols Middle School. Students were given T-shirts and \$25 dollar Walmart gift cards for faithfully attending sessions and participating in the program.

The A-TEAAM, The Evers Academy for African American Males, formerly known as the Community Engagement and Empowerment Network (CEEN) Black Belt Initiative was started last year by Dr. Juanita Sims-Doty. She initiated the CEEN Black Belt mentoring programs at Blackburn and Nichols Middle School. Dr. Juanita Sims Doty, JSD Foundation Chair, says she is excited about the impact this mentoring program is having on the lives of so many black males. She says she is grateful to the 21 organizations for working together to make this academy a success.

About the A-TEAAM

A-TEEAM is a mentorship program for Black males in middle school. Mentors come from Community Engagement and Empowerment Network (CEEN) volunteers. Mentors' roles are to inspire the participants to honor the life and legacy of Medgar Evers. The A-TEAAM's purpose is to improve the quality of life for young Black males by equipping them with skills, knowledge, and support of caring mentors. Their interactions are guided by a meaningful curriculum designed to empower the students as they navigate through middle school.



Porter Middle School hosts "Common Core Night"

Porter Middle School leaders held "Common Core Night" to help parents understand the new rigors of the state standards. Educators shared PowerPoint Presentations, utilized hands on demonstrations and experiments, and answered questions to help inform parents about Common Core.

*Why Common Core Standards?

Mississippi adopted Common Core State Standards (CCSS) in 2010 because they provide a consistent, clear understanding of what students are expected to learn so that teachers and parents know what they need to do to help them. Consistent standards, also adopted by 45 other states, will provide appropriate academic benchmarks for all students at each grade level, regardless of where they live.

The standards incorporate the best and highest of previous state standards in the U.S. and are internationally benchmarked to the top performing nations around the world.

Students will learn the skills and abilities demanded by the workforce of today and the future. The standards emphasize critical thinking, teamwork and problem-solving skills.

The standards are grounded in college and career readiness.

*What will Mississippi Common Core State Standards mean to students and parents?

- With the CCSS, parents will know exactly what their children should learn by the end of each grade level.
- The new standards are more rigorous and students will be learning important concepts in earlier grades.
- The Common Core shifts instruction from high school completion to college- and career-readiness for every student.
- When the standards are fully implemented, parents will see that each grade covers fewer topics, but teaches content in much greater depth.
- Curriculum and assessments are evolving to align with the Common Core.
- With the Common Core, parents can be assured that their students are learning to the same high-quality standards as other students across the country.
- New tests will measure learning under CCSS. These tests will be more difficult, which will mean that scores will be lower initially.

Goodloe Elementary held its Parent Academy to help parents experience and understand the new rigors of Common Core. You may have already noticed that your children's homework is getting tougher. They are expected to learn in new ways and educators are expected to teach more in depth. Mississippi's students and teachers can meet the challenge of these higher standards but they need your support to succeed. If you notice your child is struggling in a certain area, talk with your child's teacher to identify strategies and resources that may be helpful. You are empowered to find ways to make sure your child reaches his/her full potential under these new standards.

What can parents do to help their children achieve at these higher levels?

- Stay in touch with your children's teacher and monitor your children's school performance. Let your children know school work is important to you and that you expect them to do their best.
- ▶ Be ready to support your children as assignments become more difficult to read and more challenging to write. Be patient. Provide the time and location and resources needed to study at home.
- There is no substitute for reading. Reading a variety of books increases vocabulary, comprehension, general knowledge of the world, and love of learning. The more you read, the better reader you are! From the time your children are young, provide regular, structured time for reading. Fill your home with opportunities to read. Show them that you are a reader, too.

CANTON CAREER CENTER SPEAKERS

"Career Planning" Speaker: Wendy Peeples/Holmes Community College

Wendy Peeples spoke to students about the importance of selecting courses that will help them reach their career goals. Peeples informed students that it is never too early to plan for their future. She encouraged students to seek out affordable, local junior colleges that may offer many of their required basic courses for a fraction of the cost, before they head off to more expensive four year universities. Peeples told students it's also an excellent way to see if they want to pursue college or enter the workforce.







"Credit Day" Speaker: Simon Collier, Vice President of the Canton BankPlus Branch

Simon Collier gave students tips on mastering personal finance. He told students they are in charge and responsible for their finances that's why they must create a realistic budget and stick to it. Collier warned students to watch their spending, use credit wisely, get a bank account, and be particular, don't just trust anybody with your money. He says most importantly save your money so you are financially prepared for the unexpected. Collier told students to apply for scholarships, consider buying used books to save money, and try to entertain on a budget by limiting spending on fun items or activities. He told students to remember what's important —things you need like food, shelter, and clothing, as opposed to things you want. Collier told students not to be afraid to ask questions of their parents or a banker if they want to learn more about taking charge of their finances.







"Career Options" Speaker: Joshua Seymour/Staff Sergeant Recruiting & Retention NCO Mississippi National Guard (Canton Armory)

Staff Sergeant Joshua Seymour, a recruiter for the MS National Guard, shared with students the career opportunities that await them if they choose to pursue the armed services after graduating from high school. He told students he can retire from the military at the age of 41. He has served four years of active duty in the army in addition to several years as an engineer and recruiter for the MS National Guard. He told students if they choose the military, they can also get scholarships to pay for their education while serving their country.







NICHOLS MIDDLE SCHOOL PARENT ACADEMY

At Nichols Middle School's Parent Academy, educators shared information about how they can help students transition to Common Core. They told parents don't be afraid to reach out to your child's teacher—because they are an important part of their child's education. Ask to see a sample of your child's work or bring a sample with you. Ask the teacher questions like:

- Is my child at the level where he/she should be at this point of the school year?
- What do you think is giving my child the most trouble? How can I help my child improve in this area?

Where is my child excelling? How can I support this success?

What students will be learning in English Language Arts and Literacy:

Students will read a range of challenging books, articles, and texts, and will be expected to demonstrate their understanding of the material by answering questions and contributing to class discussions. In writing, students will continue to work on their use of language, sentence structure, and organization of ideas. They will also be expected to integrate information from different sources and respond to challenging content through written interpretation and analysis.

As they progress through grade levels, students will be asked more questions that require them to cite details or information from increasingly challenging texts. This will encourage them to become observant and analytical readers.

Some writing guidelines may seem similar from year to year. However, with practice at each grade level, students continue to learn and apply the rules of standard written English and to strengthen and expand their vocabulary, use of language, and sophistication in the development and organization of ideas.

What students will be learning in Mathematics:

In mathematics, this means three major changes. Teachers will concentrate on teaching a more focused set of major math concepts and skills. This will allow students time to master important ideas and skills in a more organized way throughout the year and from one grade to the next. It will also call for teachers to use rich and challenging math content and to engage students in solving real-world problems in order to inspire greater interest in mathematics.


