### 3 Schools Rated Successful



The Canton Public School District has worked hard to increase student achievement. Over the last several years it has made undeniable, continuous progress. As a result, this year the Mississippi Department of Education has rated **three** of the district's schools "Successful". Canton Elementary went from "Academic Watch" to "Successful". Canton School of Arts & Sciences went from "Low Performing" to "Successful". Nichols Middle School met growth and maintained its "Successful" rating. However, Canton High School did not meet growth; it now has a "Low Performing" label. As a result, the district was rated "Low Performing". We are disappointed that we missed getting a higher label by 1.7 points. However, we are not discouraged. Our district is still making progress. To move from having only one successful school to having 3 successful schools, shows that we are clearly making progress as a district. Under the federal model, Canton Public Schools had no priority schools. We are definitely encouraged by our progress.

As the Canton Public School District works to overcome years of challenges, its progress is evident in its lower dropout rate and increased graduation rate. In 2006, the district's dropout rate was 42.7% and its graduation rate was 41.8 percent. Today the district's graduation rate has improved to 71.6 percent. That's 30% more of its students graduating from school. The district's dropout rate has been tremendously lowered to 22.4 percent. That's 20% more students choosing to stay in school. Over the last six years, approximately 400 more students have earned their high school diploma. The district has also improved its culture and climate, decreased student discipline problems, increased student attendance, and increased parental involvement. The district has made tremendous social and academic progress among other improvements. It has also been very fiscally conservative and responsible with taxpayer dollars.

However, while we have made some incredible gains, we know we must continue to intensify our efforts to keep improving our students' academic performance. We are looking at data and are devising a plan of action to strengthen areas of weakness. We are putting forth all our efforts to provide quality personnel and other resources needed to improve in these areas. We have an improvement plan already in motion to support more focused efforts at Canton High School. We still want to make sure that our successful schools continue to improve and grow academically. As a district, we are continuing to focus on improving teaching and learning for all of our students.

As the district continues to work hard to improve its performance, it is encouraged by the progress that its students, teachers, administrators, and parents have made. We are all working together to move our district to greater academic success.

Therefore, when you hear these new labels please also know that we are a work in progress, we are improving, and we are achieving as we reach new heights.

### Graduation Rate Increases/Dropout Rate Decreases

The Canton Public School District Makes a Significant Increase in its Graduation Rate

In 2006, when Superintendent Dwight Luckett took the helm of the Canton Public School District, he faced a daunting task of lowering the district's dropout rate from 42.7% and raising its graduation rate from 41.8 percent. Today the district's graduation rate has improved to 71.6 percent. That's 30% more of its students graduating from school. The district's dropout rate has been tremendously lowered to 22.4 percent. That's 20% more students choosing to stay in school. Over the last six years, approximately 400 more students have earned their high school diploma. This accomplishment comes after several years of constantly communicating the district's vision, restructuring the leadership team, and refocusing the district by raising expectations. While the district still faces many challenges and has not reached its full potential, there has been steady progress and the district is encouraged to stay the course until more of its students graduate and go on to pursue higher degrees.

What are the district's improvements over the last several years attributed to? "There are a number of factors involved. An increased focus on academic performance, communicating the message of the importance of graduation starting from kindergarten through high school, identifying students who are at risk of failing and dropping out, removing 90% of our over-aged students in middle school and placing them in a fast track program that better caters to their needs are all factors that helped the district improve. The district has also done a better job of tracking students in terms of what courses or subject area tests they need and offering more assistance to their specific needs. It has been a district wide effort coupled with better parental involvement. The district has raised expectations for students to not only graduate but to go on to college to pursue higher degrees."

Luckett says he appreciates the efforts of the team of professionals working together to accomplish the goals and mission of the district. "I cannot praise our teachers and administrators enough for their relentless efforts to move our district to a higher level of success. It takes a team effort to reach greater academic performance." He says the State Department of Education and the district's School Board of Trustees have also been supportive in the process.

Dropout prevention starts with making parents and the community aware by placing more emphasis on the needs of students. The district pays close attention to the demographics of the students it serves. The district understands the environments from which they come and place a greater emphasis on meeting them where they are. The district also focuses on the needs of students with disabilities so they can graduate or receive certificates of completion.

Here are just a few of the changes the district has made over the years to aid in its dropout prevention efforts:

- Improved Curriculum alignment
- Developed district test to track students' progress
- Revamped curriculum and state and federal programs offices
- Hired new principals
- Increased intense data-driven professional development and teacher & principal coaching
- Improved the culture and climate at all schools
- Increased daily average attendance at all schools
- Improved parental involvement
- Implemented a speaker series to get professionals to talk to students about career choices
- Increased mentors
- Offered Saturday school
- Offered afterschool tutorial

Luckett says he is hopeful the district is positioning itself to reach its full potential in the near future and meet the challenges of more rigorous state requirements.

Instruction during the two year course includes an overview of health career opportunities, theory and principles of healthcare, basic entry level experiences are also correlated with classroom instruction to help students acquire the knowledge, skills, and behavior necessary for health care careers. Students also become certified in CPR as well as participate in "real life" clinical settings at local nursing homes, hospitals, specialty clinics and field trips to the universities in the surrounding areas.

The GED program is part of the Canton Public School District's initiative to reduce the dropout rate. The GED program option is available to **students ages 16—19 who meet the eligibility requirements and are enrolled at Canton High School**.


Fast Facts: 1. The student must be at least 16 years of age; 2. The student must be at least one (1) full grade level behind his or her ninth grade cohort or must have acquired less than four (4) Carnegie units; 3. The student must have taken every opportunity to continue to participate in course work leading to a regular diploma; and 4. The student must be certified to be eligible to participate in the GED course by the school district superintendent, based on the developed criteria. 5. There are only 15 slots available and students will be selected based on the greatest need using specific criteria outlined in district procedures.
